ALMC Bunny Run MVAT

8th April



Puddenhill Activity Centre near Garristown was the comfort-

able event headquarters for the ALMC Bunny Run Multivenue Autotest. A full breakfast menu was available to those of the 26 starters, from near and far, who arrived early enough on a cloudy, but dry, Easter Sunday morning.

With route and test details having been posted in advance, the competitors knew what to expect and were eagerly awaiting a busy day with 20 tests in 4 different locations.

The first 2 tests were in Puddenhill. Everyone seemed to be waiting for someone else to go first on Test 1. It was James Wilson who finally took the plunge while everyone else watched. Unfortunately, on the first manoeuvre he pulled a driveshaft

and that was the last we were to see of his immaculate Mini. Not of James, though, as he was

immediately offered a doubledrive in Frank Lenehan's less immaculate Starlet

Test 1 was a mixture of tarmac, concrete and gravel with Test 2 around a sandy and very dusty horse training ring. Tests 3 and 4 were about five miles away with T3 on dry concrete and much of T4 a complicated, but logical, set of manoeuvres inside a dim and very aromatic shed.

On then, to Bellewstown Race Course, where 2 gravel / shale tests awaited us. The first,

T5, was long and open with a quite a few surface changes. The site is on quite a steep incline, so it was easy to lose time on the loose uphill stretches. T6 was shorter, flatter and sandier with so much dust it was flowing down the windscreen like water at times

The final site was a quarry. T7 was fast on gravel with some unusual uphill throws and astride lines along with the use of small piles of gravel as pylons. T8, my favourite, was long and open, with plenty of 2nd gear and no reverses. Again, the dust made it difficult to keep your bearings. T9 was on grippy concrete with an unusual series of side by side lines to be taken nose-in and tail-in alternately.

The balance of the tests were revisits of the previous 4 sites with some done in the reverse direction, with tweaks. With the final 2 tests back at Puddenhill, it was no time at all before the results were compiled and awards presented.

The whole day was run without any delays, thanks to great preparation by Martin Devine and his fellow ALMC members. The tests were very challenging without being car breakers so, apart from James, I don't think there were any retirements. The marshals were fantastic. The dust they had to endure was unbelievable along with some rain towards the end.



Well done to Eamonn, James and Frank for their top 3





placings, but especially, also, to Harold and Ron for breaking the Starlet top 12 monopoly in their NISSAN SUNNYs with 4th and 7th respectively (Roses amongst thorns). Rear Wheel Drivers were very scarce for some reason so it was good to have Piers



hanging his a**e out on the loose for a bit of a diversion. Mark FitzSimon came out of a 20+ year



retirement to share my Starlet and performed very well, while having the manners not to beat me.

As always, looking at the pictures and videos posted afterwards added to the enjoyment of the event. Thanks to all.


James Pringle International Trophy Autotest 5th May






